Pastor's Ponderings

"Now there was a woman who had been suffering...she had endured much...and she was no better, but rather grew worse." MARK 5:25-26 (PARTIALLY) Dear Healed Sinners:

His struggle felt real enough, at least to him. Most people he talked with just shrugged and said it's what happens when you get older. Most of the time he just felt lethargic, lazy, sluggish, without any energy to do

what he used to enjoy. He couldn't remember the last time he went fishing or out to watch the races. Recently he started to have some pains and didn't even want to eat anymore. He knew something was wrong but just couldn't figure it out. His wife said he needed to get outside more, get some sun, do something. So, he tried that – he would get up and go out to the patio and sit in the sun but still felt awful. His children said he needed to get some vitamins and some good nutrients in him. So, he ordered some vitamin C, D, K, and a little iron, but none of it seemed to help.

Finally, knowing that something just wasn't right, he went to his doctor. He explained his condition and his pains while the doctor prodded and poked, checking all his vitals. A round of lab tests later, the doctor was certain the man had some disease with a long unrecognizable name. He was prescribed a drug with yet another unrecognizable and convoluted name that he started taking right away. But, after a while, he didn't feel any better. He figured his doctor got it wrong, so he booked an appointment with another doctor in another practice. Yet another round of tests was ordered, and a new prescription was given. But again, he didn't feel any better. So, he gave up on the doctors and went to an herbalist, figuring that if modern medicine couldn't help cure him, then perhaps there was an old school home remedy that could help. Yet nothing worked. He took all the foulest tasting medicines and mixes, and he wasn't getting any better, in fact he was getting worse. He felt like it was hopeless, nothing would help him, he couldn't find a cure.

This fictional story of a sick man describes the human condition that happens because of sin. Sin will attack us and pull us down; it makes us unfit. Even when we know we are not right and try to battle against it, we can be overwhelmed. We can listen to what others say, shrugging it off as normal. Or perhaps we get some pointers to control it. We may even follow the advice of experts who think they know the best ways to beat the troubles that sin and evil can cause. But really, there is nothing we are able to do, nothing we can ever achieve can free us totally from that broken, painful sentence of sin and death. We are helpless to do anything against it, in fact we just "grow worse."

Yet Jesus, the Lord and Savior, says, "...faith has healed you. Go in peace..." By the Spirit of God that instills belief in us to trust in the one who justifies, washes away our sins – by this faith we are made right. This is the teaching of the Lutheran Church, this is our assured hope, that as sinners without our own means to find the cure, we have one true salvation to trust in: our Savior and Lord. This Reformation month, let us give thanks to the one who gives us life.

Diana made these ornaments for St. Mark for many years. Each Christmas they are offered for dedication in


